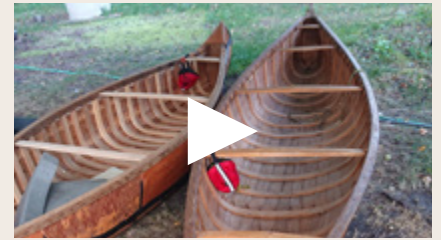

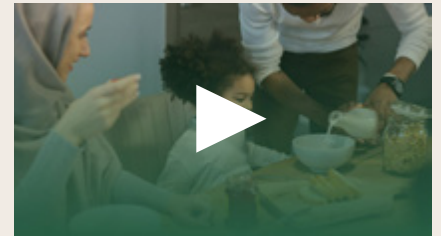

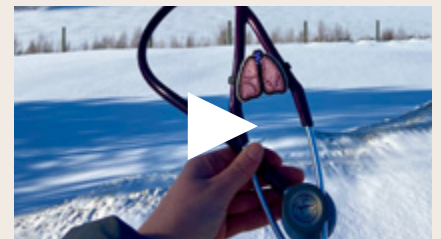

Impact Investments

In 2025, Definity Foundation invested \$5.5M into nine impact funds, growing our impact investment portfolio to \$9M.

100% of our impact investments align with our Community Investment Framework, mobilizing more capital to underrepresented fund managers and communities.

Our Portfolio

Ulnooweg Education Centre Mortgage*

\$1,500,000

A 0% interest mortgage for Asitu'lisk in Mi'kma'ki redirects interest savings into Indigenous youth programs in entrepreneurship, culture, and language strengthening land stewardship and creating lasting, intergenerational community impact.

Regenerative Capital Fund I

\$500,000

Supports the transition of Canadian businesses to adopt regenerative practices that strengthen people, communities, and the planet while building resilient enterprises.

African Canadian Farmers Fund*

\$250,000

Enables African Canadian farmers to own farmland through flexible rent-to-own financing, advancing food sovereignty and long-term wealth in Black communities.

ACBN Microloan Fund*

\$500,000

Provides small loans and hands-on support to Black entrepreneurs shut out of traditional financing, expanding access to capital and building community wealth.

EntrepreNorth Sinew Impact Fund*

\$500,000

Delivers flexible, long-term capital and business support to Northern Indigenous entrepreneurs, strengthening food systems, housing, climate resilience, and local economies across the North.

Metis Settlements Impact Fund I

\$750,000

Drives Métis-led investments in Indigenous-owned businesses, creating jobs and long-term prosperity in the Métis Settlements of Alberta.

NextGen Impact Venture Fund

\$500,000

Backs a youth-led fund investing in early-stage climate, health, food, and infrastructure ventures by fueling innovation while building the next generation of impact leaders.

Weave Community Bond Fund

\$500,000

Powers Canada's first national pooled community bond fund, financing nonprofits and co-ops to expand affordable housing, renewable energy, and vital local infrastructure.

Migr8 Capital Fund I

\$500,000

Invests in first-generation, racialized newcomer tech founders advancing the Sustainable Development Goals, expanding access to capital and inclusive growth in the Prairie region.

A Snapshot

Our Strategic Plan in Action

We tested new approaches, strengthened partnerships, and deployed capital, influence, and learning in more integrated ways.

Our work generated practical insights about what it truly takes to shift systems. The lessons emerging from this year are sharpening our strategy, deepening our relationships, and strengthening our capacity to pursue long-term, equitable change in communities.

Our strategic imperatives:

- Flow capital to underfunded regions and communities
- Advance collaborative innovation
- Take a holistic approach to philanthropy
- Strengthen organizational effectiveness

 **Flowing Capital to Underfunded Regions and Communities**

Our Actions

Finalized Northern research project and convened funders in the North, and those investing in the North, for the purposes of co-learning.

What we learned

Intermediaries and place-based funders in Northern communities support “For the North, by the North” models, enabling decisions to remain within the community while strengthening long-term capacity.

Made our first grant dedicated exclusively to the Yukon. We have deepened relationships with partners in the North, and have active investments in every Canadian territory. Our grants and impact investments in the North comprise 21% of all our multi-year commitments.

Lasting impact comes not from one-time investments, but from relational philanthropy that backs local leadership over time. In often overlooked regions, sustained engagement builds the trust needed for meaningful, community-led change.

 **Advance Collaborative Innovation**

Our Actions

Joined 10+ funders to launch the Charitable and Nonprofit Sector Infrastructure Collaborative Fund.

A lead funder in developing a pooled guarantee fund to de-risk community-based social finance intermediaries.

What we learned

Funders working collectively as a de-risking mechanism can mobilize more resources toward sustainable infrastructure that fosters resilience, collaboration and collective impact.

Helped shape the Victoria Forum’s Regenerative Economy Program and joined the design team for Environment Funders Canada’s 2026 conference.

Convening is a form of field-building: it shapes the conversations, relationships, and spaces where shared priorities and decisions emerge.





Take a Holistic Approach to Philanthropy

Our Actions

Welcomed Stephen Huddart as Senior Fellow, Systems Innovation Finance.

Made our first \$1.5M, 0% interest mortgage with Ulnooweg Education Centre, coupled with a co-investment of \$250,000 from Definity Financial.

Signed the [Fund Canada](#) pledge and committed \$11M as part of a \$334.9M coalition of asset owners.

Together with nine peer philanthropic institutions representing over \$1.75B in assets, we submitted a letter supporting the government’s mandate to mobilize public and private capital for solutions that benefit Canadians.

What we learned

Advancing systems innovation requires dedicated intellectual and relational capacity. A Senior Fellow strengthens our ability to spot emerging opportunities, shape policy, and translate global insight into Canadian action.

Blended finance can bridge persistent funding gaps for community partners. By pairing a 0% mortgage with corporate co-investment, we showed how philanthropic capital can unlock additional investment and better align financing with partner needs.

Systems change requires aligning regulation, capital, and community priorities. Influence grows when exercised collectively.



Strengthen Organizational Effectiveness

Our Actions

Launched the [Grapple and Voices of Impact video series](#).

Strengthened our brand identity and launched a refreshed public presence.

Participated in global learning, including the Global Impact Investing Network conference and Philea Futures, deepened our understanding of catalytic capital, blended finance, and mission-aligned investing.

What we learned

Credible storytelling helps make complex systems-change work more accessible and strengthens trust with partners and the public.

Engaging global peers deepens learning, shapes key conversations, builds strategic relationships, and positions work within the broader momentum for meaningful change.





Our Reflections

Advancing our Philanthropic Approach

Over the past year, we broadened how we deploy our financial capital, voice, relationships, and influence to help shift systems.

We intentionally leaned into our full set of assets and different forms of capital, including our time, influence, knowledge and, networks, in ways that were both responsive and grounded in community priorities.

The reflections highlight the insights that emerged through this work and how they are informing a more integrated and intentional approach to advancing health, climate, social and economic justice.



Capital as Catalyst

Our work reinforced that financial capital plays a catalytic role in systems change. Funding is not only a resource, it is a signal. It builds confidence, influences decisions, and demonstrates shared commitment to emerging solutions.

When funders act collectively, capital can generate momentum and lower barriers for others to participate.

Consistency also matters, particularly during economic uncertainty. Sustained investment in equity-deserving communities is essential to maintaining trust and supporting long-term progress.

Our engagement in blended finance and policy also underscored that the structure of capital matters as much as its scale. Financial tools must be intentionally designed to address root causes and systemic barriers if they are to generate durable impact.

Voice as influence

Our experience underscored the power of voice in shaping systems. The way ideas are framed influences how challenges are understood and what solutions are considered possible. Thoughtful, values-driven narratives can expand conversations, influence capital flows and policy direction, and connect actors across sectors.

At the same time, effective leadership requires more than strong ideas. It requires translating complex concepts into language that resonates across diverse audiences and contexts.



Policy as Enabler

Policy plays a critical role in shaping the conditions for innovation. Regulatory frameworks can either enable new approaches to emerge or constrain their development. Thoughtful policy reform can accelerate and sustain financial innovations that serve the public good.

This year also highlighted the importance of collective advocacy. When institutions speak together, they strengthen legitimacy and increase the likelihood of meaningful policy progress.

Durable systems change ultimately depends on alignment. Regulation, capital, and community priorities must move together for change to take root and scale equitably.

Convening as Infrastructure

Convening emerged as essential sector infrastructure. Bringing people together does more than facilitate dialogue, it shapes priorities, influences decision-making, and helps normalize new approaches.

Our experience also reinforced the importance of community-led intermediaries. Legitimacy and long-term impact depend not only on who participates, but on who designs and holds the space.

In this way, convening helps determine where ideas take root, how relationships evolve, and how conversations translate into action.





Learning as Discipline

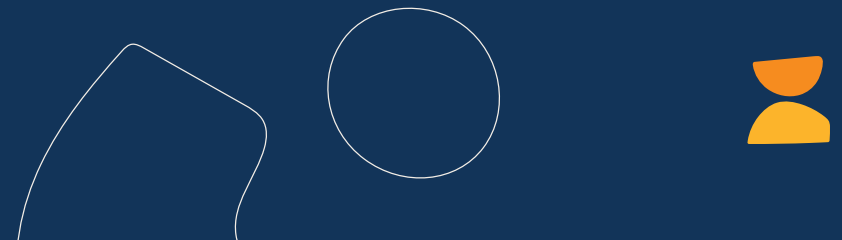
Learning remains central to navigating complex systems and strengthening strategy. Engagement with global peers expanded our understanding of catalytic capital, blended finance, and mission-aligned investing, while challenging us to think more ambitiously about what is possible.

These exchanges also reinforced that systems innovation requires both early risk-taking and strong cross-sector collaboration. Transformative ideas rarely advance in isolation.

Equally important is grounding global insight in a local context. Translating emerging practices to Canadian realities requires humility, adaptation, and partnership.

Toward a more integrated and intentional approach

Taken together, these insights reaffirm that capital, voice, policy, convening, and learning are mutually reinforcing levers of systems change. Advancing health, climate, social and economic justice requires aligning and deploying them strategically, recognizing that durable progress emerges when these forces work in concert rather than in isolation.



The Next Chapter in Our Journey

As we reflect on our progress and listen to community leadership, we are choosing to focus more intentionally on a future that is grounded in climate, health, social and economic justice.

By becoming more strategically focused and deepening our relational practices, we can better confront pressing inequities, shift power, and generate meaningful, durable impact for communities.

Our 'learning while doing' practice has brought greater clarity. We will evolve our Community Investment Framework to focus on where we can have the greatest impact. By refining our approach, we aim to enhance our systems-change efforts, strengthen trusted partnerships,

and more directly confront structural inequities. Our dedication to climate, health, social and economic justice continues to guide us, even as we rethink how best to advance these priorities.

This intentional evolution marks the next chapter of our journey. Building on three years of insight, our refreshed strategy will position us to be more focused, adaptive, and impactful in advancing systems transformation.

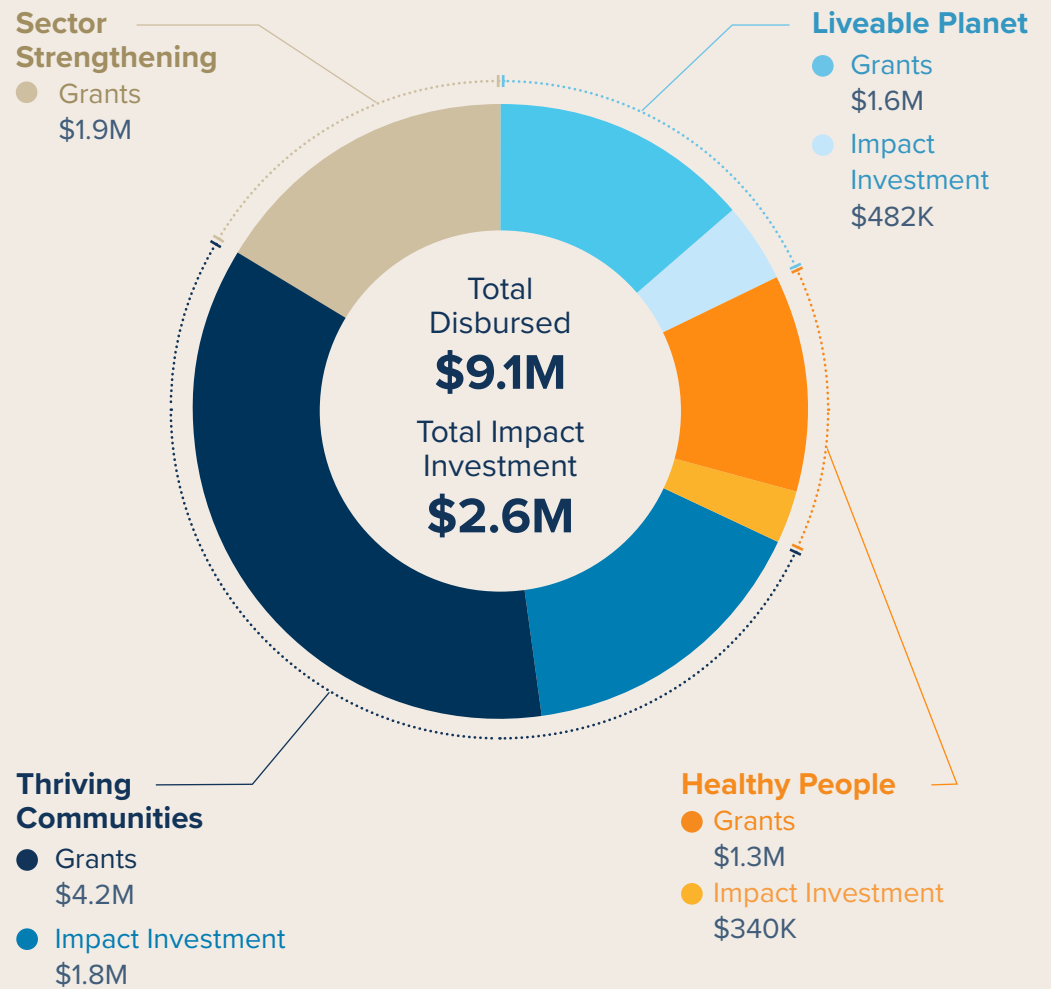
